
6616 is a collaboration between two artists based in Glasgow and Montreal. It is an ongoing cycle of work that explores the intersections of the sublime and the grotesque, unraveling the peripheries of revelation and concealment, employing the body variously as material, site and agent.





Fiona Annis is a visual artist and researcher at the Glasgow School of Art. Her practice involves probing and documenting unfoldings, ranging from the sublime to the grotesque. She is currently exploring a new cycle of work, 6616, in collaboration with JPC/K.

La Bombe Tulipe | Bombs


smuggled bulbs (or any other kind of seed) dug in spaces never meant to grow they are the prohibited, the guillotined.
